



Suffix -ing and Suffix -ed

Use of suffixes -ing and -ed after the root words

A suffix is a group of letters added at the end of the root word to form a new word with a different meaning.

- Suffix -ing means action.
- Suffix -ed means past action.

Note: When a word ends in a single consonant preceded by a single vowel and the word is one syllable or accented on the last syllable, then double the final consonant when adding a vowel suffix.

Follow the above rules and use the correct suffixes -ing and -ed after the words and fill in the blanks to complete the sentences.
